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The Connecticut Energy Efficiency Board (EEB) and the Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) invite you to a Public Input Session for development of the 2023 Update to the Conservation and Load Management (C&LM) Plan. The meeting will be webinar only; webinar information is provided above. Please note: the EEB will hold its July monthly meeting, also by webinar, immediately following the Public Input Session.

Established through CGS 16-245m, the EEB is comprised of 12 voting members¹ representing business and consumer interests as well as state agencies, and five non-voting representatives of the state's electric and gas utilities. It advises and assists the utilities in the development and implementation of Connecticut's energy efficiency and demand response plans.

The EEB and DEEP welcome and encourage input as part of the collaborative process with the electric and gas utility companies, the CT Green Bank, interested stakeholders and the public to develop the 2023 Plan Update. Public input will inform the EEB and DEEP on updates to the C&LM Plan that will take effect in 2023.

Please include your name, company, and electronic copies of your remarks, and/or a PowerPoint presentation if you plan to use one. A record of public input becomes part of the 2023 Plan Update itself. Therefore, it is important that commenters provide written input, preferably in advance of the session. Presentations during the Public Input Session should be no longer than seven minutes.
